We advance educational equity by building long-term partnerships with students, families, communities, and schools to create experiences outside of school that inspire the joy of learning.

The Horizons Model

Horizons Greater Philadelphia (HGP) partners with four sites to offer a six-week, tuition-free summer program designed to address educational disparities. Through a dynamic and engaging learning environment, Horizons nurtures students' curiosity and passion for learning. Each site provides a supportive space where students participate in a wide range of academic, artistic, and STEM-based activities that build confidence and promote growth during their critical early

Beyond the summer, students have the opportunity to engage in year-round programming that ranges from weekly afterschool sessions to quarterly family engagement events. This continuity strengthens their connection with Horizons teachers, who support them from kindergarten through 8th grade.

Core Program Components

- Rigorous academic instruction in literacy, math, projectbased learning, and social-emotional learning
- A minimum of 90 minutes of swim instruction per week
- Enrichment activities in subjects like art, music, STEM, karate, and yoga
- Nutritious meals, including free breakfast, lunch, and snacks
- Field trips, guest speakers, and special events to expand students' learning experiences
- A long-term commitment to student success

Our Host Site and Partner Schools

Each Horizons host site collaborates with 2-3 local public or charter schools that recommend students for enrollment beginning in kindergarten. This partnership fosters strong connections between school leadership and the Horizons program, ensuring continuous support for students and their families throughout the year. 


All students growth in weeks

Multi-Dimensional Math at Horizons

Recent data indicates that math scores are improving in the Philadelphia area; however, progress is slow.

According to the *PhillyVoice*, in 2023, Philadelphia's fourth-grade students improved their math scores by an average of 7 points since 2022, surpassing the national average gain of 2 points. Despite this progress, their scores remain below the national average.

These statistics underscore the ongoing challenges in math education, particularly in urban districts like Philadelphia, and highlight the need for targeted interventions, like Horizons, to support student achievement.

Horizons Greater Philadelphia is dedicated to ensuring that our sites are equipped with the curricular resources needed for all students to thrive. To accomplish this, we collaborated with site leaders to curate resources that addressed the identified academic and social-emotional learning needs of our students.

We adopted the **Math for Love** curriculum across all sites after witnessing the joy of learning math at one of our locations and the subsequent improvement in math achievement. The gamified approach of this curriculum has captured student interest and has reduced the fear often associated with math learning.

Zooming In – Reading as a Foundation for Success

Reading proficiency is foundational to academic success, yet recent assessments indicate significant challenges both nationally and in Philadelphia.

National Trends:

The 2024 National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) revealed that only 39% of fourth-grade students performed at or above the Proficient level in reading, marking a decline from previous years.

Philadelphia Specifics:

The Philadelphia Tribune published an article in March 2024 reporting that in the winter of 2023-2024, 35% of

third-grade students in Philadelphia scored at or above reading level on benchmark assessments, reflecting a 2% increase from the previous year. While some recovery efforts have been made, proficiency rates remain a concern.

Horizons' Approach

At Horizons, students engage in structured, systematic, and individualized literacy instruction throughout the six-week program, resulting in notable improvements in reading skills. Each Horizons site emphasizes literacy through daily English Language Arts (ELA) lessons, small-group Guided Reading sessions, and the integration of literacy skills into project-based learning.

Research indicates that younger students (grades K-2) tend to experience greater reading gains compared to older students. Early exposure to language plays a crucial role in literacy development, while older students who lack this foundation must first build these skills, making it harder to catch up.

To address this, Horizons tailors its literacy instruction by focusing on foundational skills—such as phonemic awareness, phonological awareness, and phonics—for students in grades K-4. For students in grades 5-8, instruction shifts toward enhancing reading comprehension skills, ensuring they develop the tools needed for continued academic success.

Each Horizons site is supported by at least one Reading Specialist who plays a key role in guiding literacy instruction, assessments, and student progress. They oversee all benchmark assessments, ensuring that reading instruction, remediation, and advancement are tailored to meet students' needs. Collaborating closely with classroom teachers, they design and implement a comprehensive summer reading plan that aligns with sitewide goals. Additionally, Reading Specialists provide targeted support by working with students individually and in small groups, prioritizing those who require the most intensive intervention. This year, Horizons had seven reading specialists across the region.

Horizons at Cristo Rey Philadelphia made an intentional investment in social and emotional programming in 2024. As Executive Director Caryn Rivers states, "In light of the epidemic of loneliness and anxiety among youth, social-emotional learning (learning the lexicon and the techniques for mindfulness and self regulation) provides a basis for resilience, trust and self-confidence which benefits everyone."



Spotlight on Swimming

Every Horizons site nationwide incorporates a minimum of 90 minutes of swim instruction per week, aiming to ensure students achieve swimming proficiency by 8th grade. In Philadelphia, Horizons host sites are fortunate to have on-site pools or collaborate with local partners such as the Columbia North YMCA and La Salle University to implement this essential program component.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), drowning is the second leading cause of unintentional injury death for children aged 5–14. These disparities are rooted in historical segregation and systemic disinvestment in public pools and swim education in communities of color following World War II. Access

to swimming facilities and lessons remains limited for many families across the United States, including those in Philadelphia.

Horizons is committed to breaking these barriers by ensuring that every student receives quality swim instruction and essential water safety skills. By providing consistent lessons in a safe and supportive environment, Horizons helps students gain confidence in the water, reduces their risk of drowning, and fosters a lifelong skill that promotes both safety and recreation. Through this program, students not only learn how to swim but also develop critical survival techniques, giving them the knowledge and ability to navigate water safely.

The **Inaugural Regional Swim Meet** embodied the spirit of Horizons, empowering students while building their confidence and skills.

In July 2024, students from all four Horizons Greater Philadelphia sites came together at La Salle University to demonstrate their swimming skills and cheer on their peers!

Training our Teachers for a Sustainable Future

In May 2024, Horizons Greater Philadelphia presented our **Inaugural Regional Professional Development Day**. This event aimed to unite Horizons teachers from all four regional locations for an interactive event focused on community engagement, collaborative learning opportunities and site sustainability.

The day included breakout sessions on Restorative Practices, Math for Love—a new math curricular tool invested in by Horizons Greater Philadelphia—and Teaching Reading Through Storytelling. Each session was carefully crafted to enhance both the academic and social-emotional development of our students while fostering a love for learning.

Each site made unique contributions to the event. **Sobeida Soto** and **Barb Bond** from Horizons at Greene Street Friends School opened the morning by sharing their reasons for returning

to Horizons each year and warmly welcoming the new staff into the Horizons team.

Dr. Kenyatta Patterson, the Site Director at Horizons at SCH Academy, led the teachers in a Harambee chant, a tradition performed by students every Friday during the summer.

Bonnie Caton, former Math Specialist at Horizons at The Episcopal Academy, facilitated the Math for Love session, showcasing the implementation and instructional strategies that contributed to their students' success after piloting the program last summer.

To conclude the event, **Caryn Rivers**, Executive Director at Horizons at Cristo Rey Philadelphia, guided a mindful moment to remind educators of their purpose.

We look forward to building on

this solid foundation at our next professional learning gathering in Spring 2025. We extend our gratitude to our inaugural sponsors, **Philadelphia Insurance Companies and BLBB Charitable**, for their support in this new regional initiative, and their role in fostering a strong community across all

four sites.
